

CRGS Year 8 Options Booklet 2025

Introduction

In order that you can study some subjects in more depth in Year 9 we are asking you to choose 3 creative subjects and two languages to follow in year 9. You should also talk to your parents/carers and teachers about the options available.

This booklet contains details of all the courses available to you. The details provided are correct at the time of printing.

Please also be aware that you may choose Fine Art and Textiles in Year 9 but would only be able to choose one of these for GCSE.

If you wish to study Art, Textiles or DT at GCSE you would need to study it in Year 9.

What are my options?

Creative subjects

You will choose 3 subjects from the following options list. Each subject will have 1 period per week for the whole year;

Art – Fine Art

Art – Textiles

Design Technology

Drama

Food Preparation and Nutrition

Music

Languages

You will choose 2 languages from the following list:

French

German

Latin

Spanish

You will also be asked to choose a reserve choice for each as we cannot guarantee your first choice due to timetabling constraints.

Choosing subjects

When making your choices, consider the following questions:

Do you enjoy the subject?

Students who enjoy their subjects tend to be the most successful. Remember that your decision should not be based on what your friends are choosing or who is currently teaching you – all that could change next year when there will be new teaching groups.

Do you need the subject?

Some of you may already have definite career plans. It is therefore essential that you choose your options to suit these paths. However, many of you will not have made decisions about your final choice of career so it is important that you keep your options open.

Who can advise me about my choices?

Advice

You should talk to your subject teachers and your form tutor. Miss Renold (Head of Main School) and Mr Carson (Head of Year 8) will also be able to offer advice, as will Mr. Keulemans (Headteacher), Mr. Alcock (Assistant Headteacher, Main School) and Mr Hoyle (Senior Assistant Headteacher).

Deadline for Choices

The deadline for handing your 'Provisional Statement of Choices' form to your tutor is Wednesday 26th February 2025. It is important that you meet this deadline so that we can start processing all the data and working out the best match possible.

Your final choice will be confirmed at the end of June.

FAQs

Will all of my choices be approved?

We cannot guarantee to meet all of your choices. Inevitably, due to timetabling constraints there will be a number of students who will have to study their reserve choice. Our aim is to establish the best possible fit for the whole year group. If we have to ask you to take up your reserve choice, a member of the Senior Leadership Team will discuss this with you.

Will I be able to change my options after I have completed the form?

Once we start to process all the forms it will become more difficult to change your options because the timetable will be under construction.

Art and Design – Fine Art

What will I study in Year 9?

This is an exciting course that allows you to develop your creative skills across a wide range of art disciplines including drawing, painting, three-dimensional design, mixed media and digital lens-based media (photography). You will explore new fun ways of working. You will discover new artists and you will take inspiration from them and your work will reflect your own interests and artistic preferences. You are actively encouraged to take ownership of your work and progress it in the way that you want to.


What skills will I learn?

The course provides a strong basis for **GCSE Fine Art**. Art is an energetic practical subject which focusses on developing creativity and gives you the opportunity to create personal, meaningful work. In Year 9 you will experiment with a wide range of materials and techniques and in the process develop your creative skills. Art provides many transferable skills which will benefit your work in other curriculum areas; all projects will involve you in research, conceptual and creative thinking, problem solving and idea development. The course links to professions such as architecture, interior design, product design, stage set design, media, film and television, video game design and concept art as well as other professions that you might not expect to have links, such as science and medicine.

What type of person do I need to be to benefit from the course?

- A desire to be expressive
- An openness to new ideas
- An inquisitive, questioning mind
- An interest in developing a growth mind-set and divergent thinking skills (creative thinking)

Art and Design – Textile Design

Why choose Art – Textiles Design?

This subject provides an opportunity for students to fulfil their practical and creative potential with exciting and innovative end results through a variety of Textiles media. Art Textiles encourages students to think outside the box, using materials in ways that they would not necessarily imagine they could be used.

What will I study in year 9?

The schemes of work have been developed as a foundation course to prepare Year 9 students for **GCSE** Art Textiles. Throughout the year students will be introduced to a variety of themes exploring a range of textile media, techniques and processes. Themes such as 'Food glorious food' Ugly Dolls and 'Messages through Graffiti and fashion' will be covered. Students will become more confident using the sewing machine and other textile embellishment/manipulation techniques such as batik, printmaking, machine and hand

embroidery, application of colour, fabric manipulation and many more.

Projects will be thematic and students will have the opportunity to develop their own individual ideas based on primary and secondary research and will often refer directly to the work of other artists, designers and makers. They will also have the opportunity to work collaboratively as part of a team and there will be an emphasis on drawing for purpose, similarly to fine art. Individuality is actively encouraged and a sense of ownership of work will be nurtured in students.

Taking this option will prepare you for continuing Art Textiles at GCSE level awarded by AQA. Experiences and skills learnt could be easily transferred into a variety of creative subjects and future career opportunities.

Design and Technology

Why Design and Technology?

The ability to think creatively and to problem solve is an asset in many walks of life. This course will equip you to develop practical solutions to design problems using a range of techniques and processes. You will gain a firm grounding in design principles, which could potentially lead you towards further design-based education and ultimately a career in one of the numerous design or engineering fields. Careers include product design, architecture, graphic design and engineering.

What will I study in Year 9?

Design and Technology will prepare you to participate confidently and successfully in an increasingly technological world. You will gain awareness and learn from wider influences on Design and Technology including historical, social, cultural, environmental and economic factors. You will have the opportunity to work creatively when designing, making and applying technical and practical expertise. You will be able to study core technical and designing and making principles, including a broad range of design processes, materials techniques and equipment.

In Year 9 you will undertake a range of mini design and technology projects and short focus practical tasks. These would include but not limited to the development of CAD skills and technical drawing skills, and the experimentation with a range of materials and processes; for example a design and make packaging, jewellery design and manufacture.

What skills do I need?

- * Creativity
- * Imagination
- * An enjoyment of designing and making
- * A desire to solve problems practically
- * An openness to new ideas

If I continued with this course in Year 10, what qualification does this course lead to?

This course leads to a GCSE qualification in Design and Technology awarded by AQA.



<u>Drama</u>

Why Study drama?

Do you want to learn performance skills, perform plays and devise your own pieces of theatre? Do you like to analyse and discuss acting performances you have seen from film or streamed theatre? Drama gives you the opportunity to do all of the above but it also equips you with highly employable communication and interpersonal skills; it will help you work as part of a team but it will also teach you how to be responsible for your own progress, to develop your self-discipline, to use your initiative and "think on your feet".

What will I study in Year 9?

You will learn the vocal and physical acting skills to help you perform and also a range of Dramatic techniques to help you practically realise your ideas. You will work on bringing a poem to life on stage, as well as creating and performing a devised piece on World War One. This will include writing your own letter from the front and performing this, as well as extracts of script.

In the second term we study Scripted acting and perform extracts from the play "Our Day Out". This includes performing comedy improvisations based on school life and designing and creating your own puppets.

In the summer term we will devise a piece of docudrama, using the "Horrible Histories" style as our inspiration, focusing on script-writing, props, multi-media and puppets

What skills do I need?

- Enthusiasm
- Imagination
- The ability to listen to your peers and work as a team
- A positive attitude
- The confidence to perform in front of your peers

If I continued with this course in Year 10, what qualification does this course lead to?

This course leads to a GCSE qualification in Drama awarded by AQA.

Food Preparation and Nutrition

What will I study in Year 9?

The scheme of work has been developed as a foundation course to prepare Year 9 students for the new GCSE Food Preparation & Nutrition. It is intended to be a practical and creative course which focuses on providing students with the necessary practical skills and nutritional knowledge they will need before commencing GCSE study and will also help develop them into independent workers who are able to make informed choices about their own health and well-being throughout their life.

The topics taught will link to the core topics delivered at GCSE which include Food, nutrition and health; Food science; Food safety; Food choice and Food provenance.

What skills will I learn?

The practical skills taught will include general practical skills such as preparing ingredients and equipment; weighing and measuring; knife skills; preparing fruit, vegetables and meat; using all elements of the cooker; using a variety of equipment; preparing, combining and shaping ingredients; making sauces; making dough; using raising agents and setting mixtures.

If I continued with this course in Year 10, what qualification does this course lead to?

This course leads to a GCSE qualification in Food Preparation and Nutrition.

<u>Music</u>

Why study Music?

Music nurtures creativity by offering numerous opportunities to write and perform while also stimulating the brain through the study of music theory and the fundamentals of how music works. It provides insights into diverse cultures from around the world and explores music's rich history. Choosing music in Year 9 will help you develop a range of valuable skills, including teamwork, resilience, and problem-solving, all of which will greatly benefit your future studies. Most importantly, music has the power to make us happier, more imaginative, and more inquisitive individuals.

Do I need to be able to play an instrument or have lessons?

No! All the skills you need to succeed in year 9 music are covered in years 7 and 8. Music is open to everyone, not just people having one-to-one music lessons.

What will I study in Year 9?

Year 9 Music lays a solid foundation for GCSE Music by focusing on the three main areas of KS4 musical study: performance, composition, and appraisal (listening to and analysing music). You will explore playing music in a variety of styles and on different instruments. Additionally, you will apply principles of music theory during composition lessons and begin building your understanding of key GCSE terms through dedicated theory lessons. There at 4 units we study across the year:

- 1. Pop Music from 1950-2020
- 2. Song Writing
- 3. Baroque Music
- 4. Student Radio

<u>French</u>



Many of you may have been to France on holiday and would like to know more about French life, French food, music, culture and language. Most university courses now have links with France and give the opportunity for a study year abroad as part of the course, whatever the main subject.

- French is the only language other than English spoken on 5 continents.
- 125 million people in over 45 countries use French on a daily basis
- French and English are the only official languages of the United Nations, NATO, UNESCO, the European Community, the International Olympic Committee, the International Red Cross...

The Year 9 Course

- At GCSE we study the AQA syllabus and continue to develop your Listening, Reading, Speaking and Writing Skills.
- You will not be able to opt for French GCSE if you drop French in Year 9 because your language skills will no longer be sufficiently developed
- You might begin to consider a year studying abroad as part of a degree course. Did you know that you can now combine lots of different subjects like law, journalism and international business with a foreign language at almost all universities?

- You will not be able to opt for Spanish GCSE if you don't choose Spanish in Year 9 because your language skills will no longer be sufficiently developed
- You might begin to consider a year studying abroad as part of a degree course. You can combine Spanish with lots of other subjects like, law, international business and journalism at almost all universities.

These unique experiences will enable pupils not only to practise speaking Spanish but also to immerse themselves in the way of life and culture whilst staying in a welcoming family environment. <u>Latin</u>

What I will study in Year 9?

Students in Year 9 continue their reading of the Cambridge Latin Course in order to learn new grammatical structures. The stories involve:

- the eruption of Mount Vesuvius and the destruction of Pompeii, from which two important characters escape and travel to Britain.
- the Roman invasion of Britain, life in a Roman province far away from Italy, and the rebellion of the Iceni & Boudica
- life in Roman Egypt, the defeat of Antony and Cleopatra at the Battle of Actium, the culture of ancient Egypt which the Romans inherited, racial violence in the streets of Alexandria, and sacred cats

How will we study?

Classes will continue to involve many of the same activities to which you have been introduced in Year 8: the Cambridge Latin Course e-learning resource, the Cambridge Latin Course website, Quizlet and Youtube.

Why might I consider opting for Latin in Year 9?

- because I have enjoyed the work in Year 8
- because I have gained a good understanding of the grammar covered in Year 8 (how nouns change their endings according to their role in a sentence, how verbs indicate who is doing them by their ending etc.)
- because I have been able to learn and remember the necessary vocabulary
- because I am interested in the Roman world and feel that I am doing OK in the language work

What might studying Latin in year 9 lead on to?

- you might decide to choose Latin as one of your options at GCSE we follow the specification of Eduqas/the Welsh Examination Board
- at GCSE we study some original Latin literature as well as some passages of Latin which have been translated into English the current topics are 'Roman chariot racing' and 'The Eruption of Vesuvius an eye witness account by Pliny'.
- you will not be able to opt for Latin GCSE if you drop Latin in Year 9 because your language skills will not be sufficiently developed
- you **will** be able to opt for Classics GCSE if you drop Latin in Year 9 because that subject involves no Latin language work (further details will be available in the Year 9 GCSE options booklet next year)
