A Level Spanish

Getting Started!

A Level study will begin with the topic areas of 'new technologies' and 'the family'. It is a good idea to keep your Spanish skills going over the summer to keep your vocabulary and tenses up to date. You can do lots of things to help prepare yourself for September and here are some of the things we would recommend looking at over the summer:

- www.languagesonline.org.uk (Choose 'español' on the language list!) This website has a large **grammar section**, which we recommend you work through, particularly the exercises for tenses. A good understanding of the tenses will give you a good, confident start to your A Level course. The site has an A Level section with **reading comprehensions** on some of the topic areas you will study during the course of the year. You may find some of the exercises difficult at first. It is a good idea to have a vocabulary book and make a note of words that you looked up or think will be useful. To help increase your vocabulary quickly we would recommend creating 'word clusters' where possible. This means that you would collect together the verb, the noun and the adjective e. g. pollute, pollution and polluted. This makes it much easier to remember more vocabulary. It's also a good idea to get into the habit of writing the different genders in a different colour.
- www.oye.org.uk This website is free outside of school hours. You could do some 'bridging the gap' useful revision by attempting the **activities on the Year 10 / Year 11 sections on any of the topics or the grammar sections**.
- The things that you enjoy doing as hobbies also exist in Spain! Young people listen to music, play sports, watch films, YouTube and use social networks. Why not mark some Spanish things as favourites on your page to have some Spanish information appear for you to practise little and often?
- **YouTube** has some fantastic **explanation videos and songs to help with all sorts of grammar points** and they are often much more interesting than a grammar book! As well as grammar points you will find short items about the topic areas you will study for A level.
- www.newsinslowspanish.com Short clips of news items from Spain will help you to keep your understanding of Spanish up to date.

A half hour of these types of activities - regularly and often - will help you make a really good start to A Level study.
